

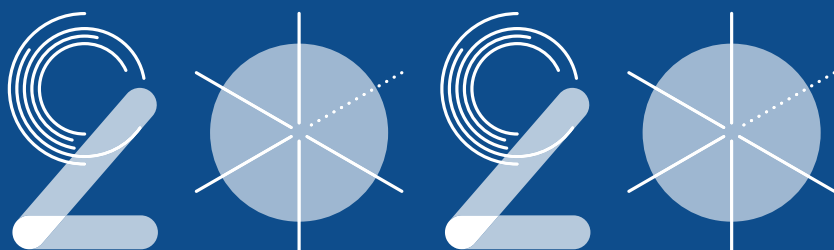

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Preface

"Jerusalem: Facts and Trends – at a Glimpse" provides an up-to-date picture of Jerusalem across a wide range of topics, including population, employment, education, building, and tourism. The publication presents the main findings of the Statistical Yearbook of Jerusalem in an accessible, user-friendly form. The preparation of the publication was particularly challenging this year as most of the work was undertaken during Corona-restrictions, with team members working from home. The publication in English this year is brief, owing to the restrictions and limitations, giving a snapshot of the main Facts and Trends in Jerusalem.

The Statistical Yearbook of Jerusalem, which contains some 250 tables and dozens of graphs, is the main source of the data presented. The Yearbook is published annually by the Jerusalem Institute for Policy Research and the Municipality of Jerusalem. The data in the Yearbook comes from multiple, varied sources, primarily the Central Bureau of Statistics, the Municipality of Jerusalem, and the National Insurance Institute.

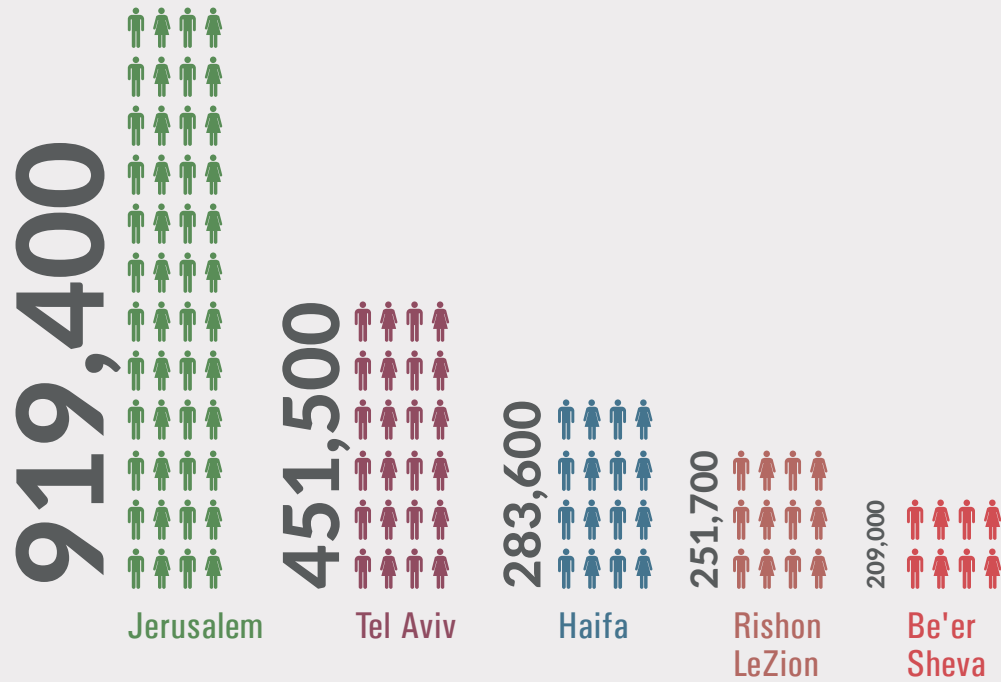

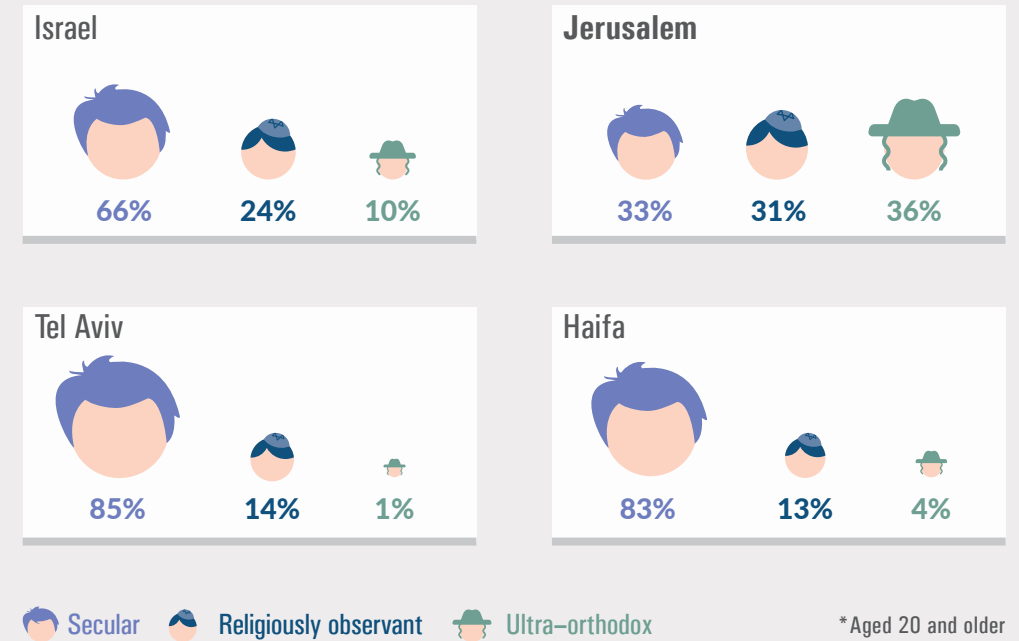
Population of Jerusalem and Israeli Major Cities, 2018

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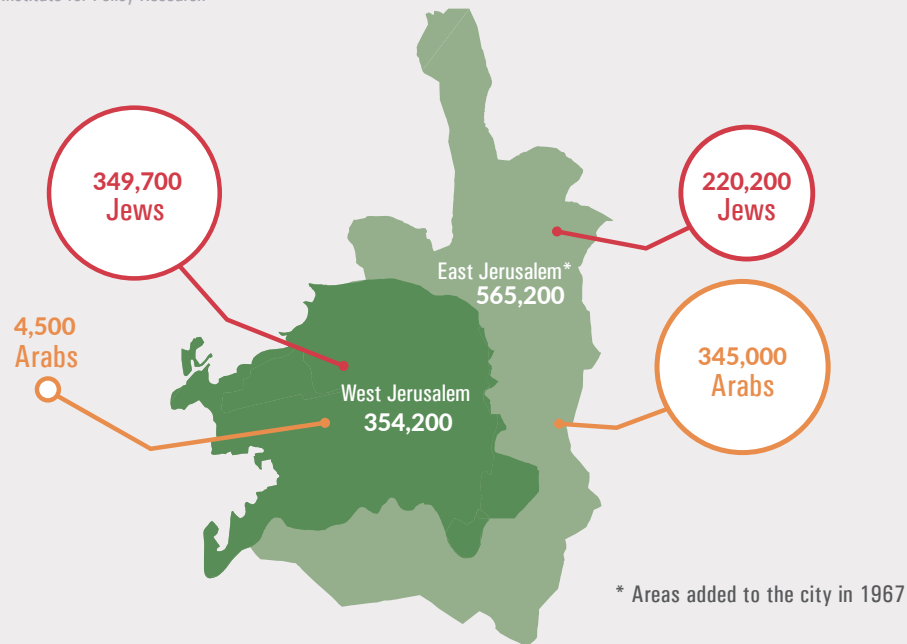
Nature of Religious Identification of the Jewish Population* in Israel and Major Cities, 2016–2018 (Average)

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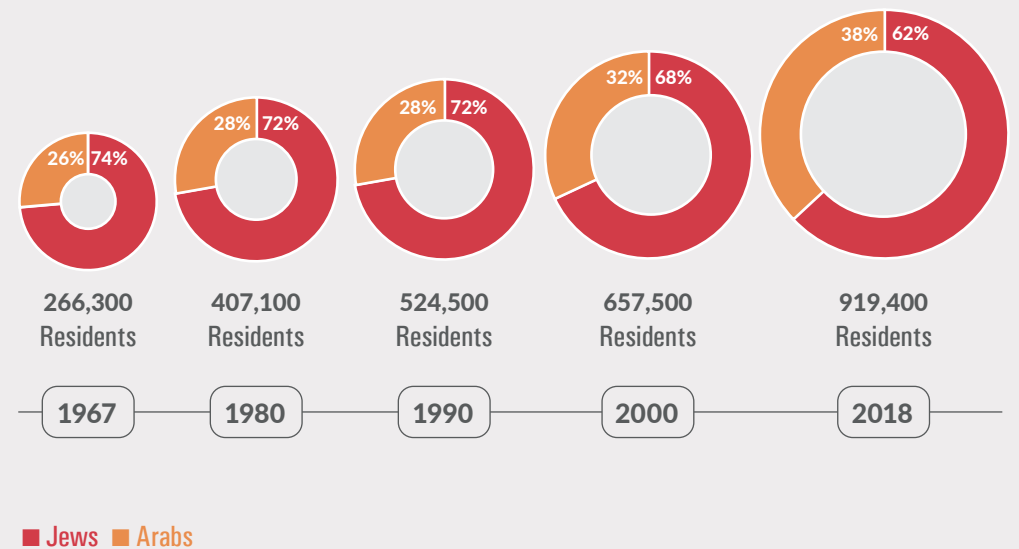
Geographical Distribution of the Jerusalem Population, 2018

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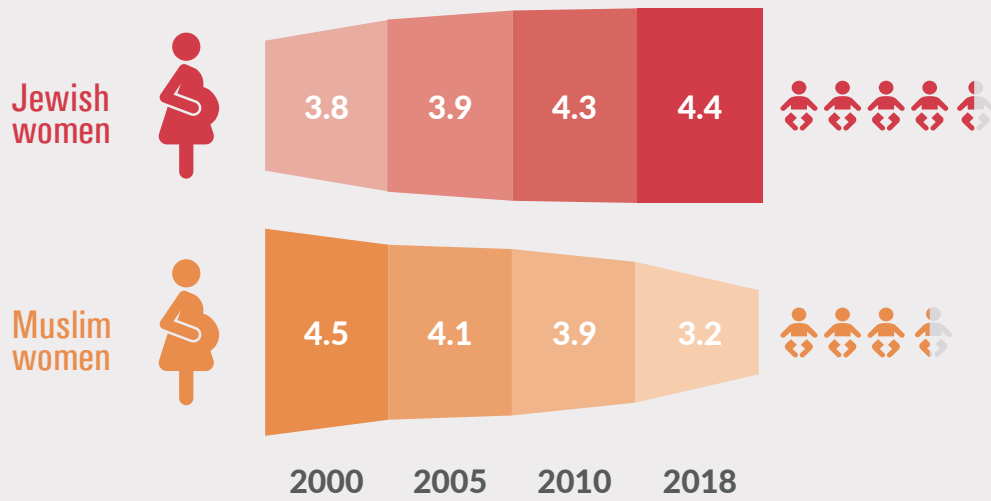
Jewish and Arab Population in Jerusalem, 1967–2018

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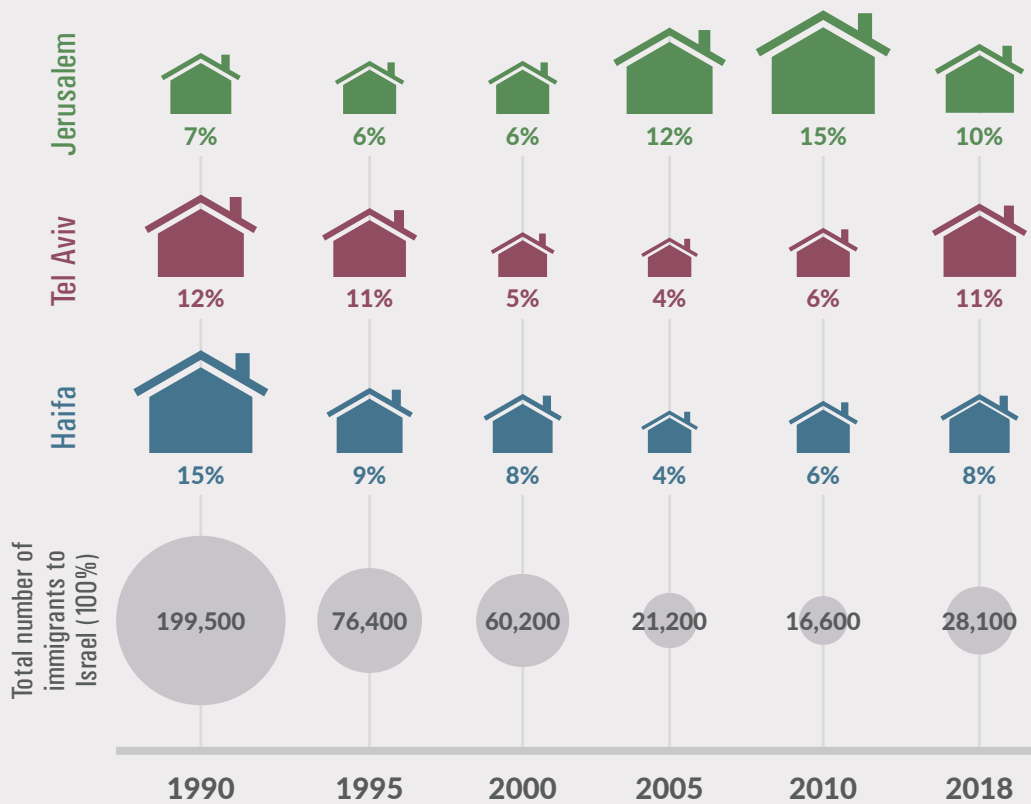
Fertility Rate of Women in Jerusalem, 2000 – 2018

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First Place of Residence of Immigrants (Olim), 1990 – 2018

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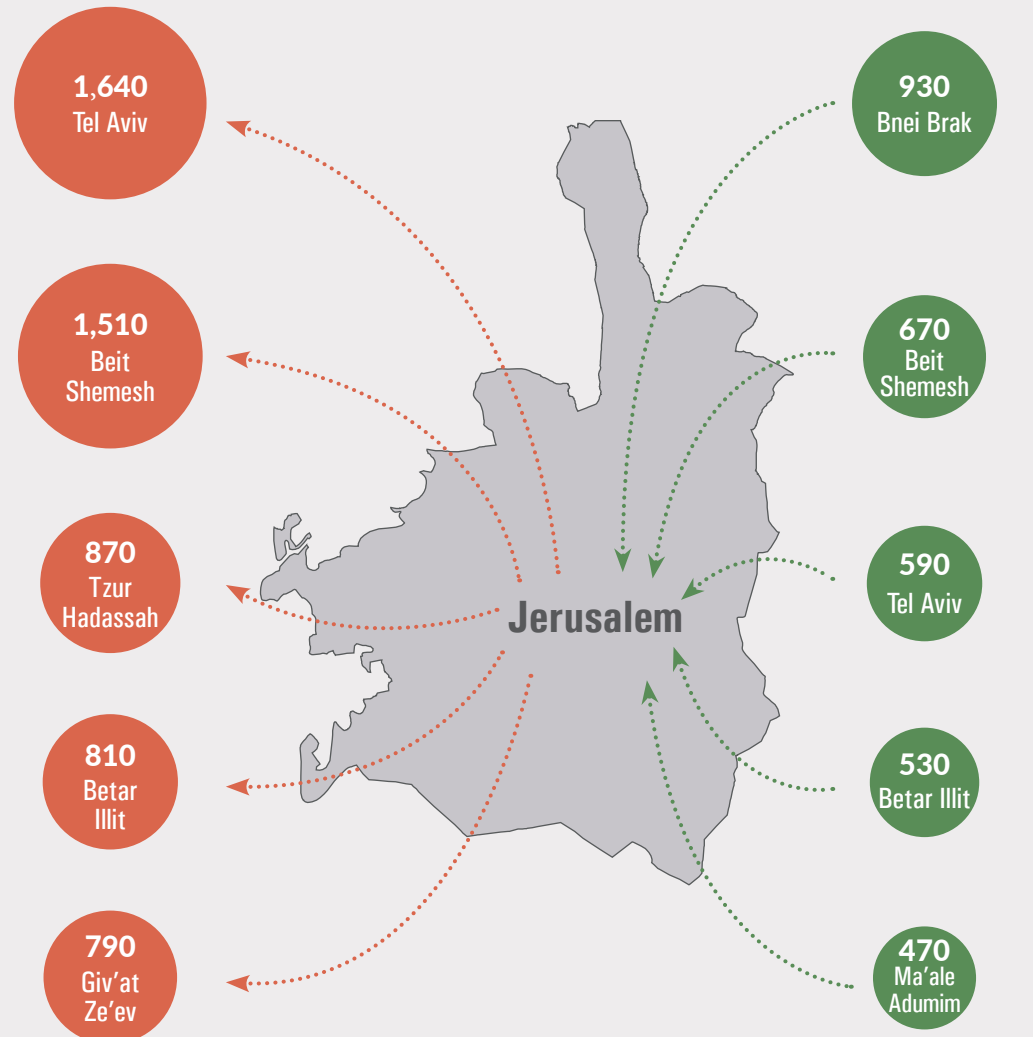


Migration to and from Jerusalem, 2018

Extent of Poverty* in Israel and Jerusalem, 2018

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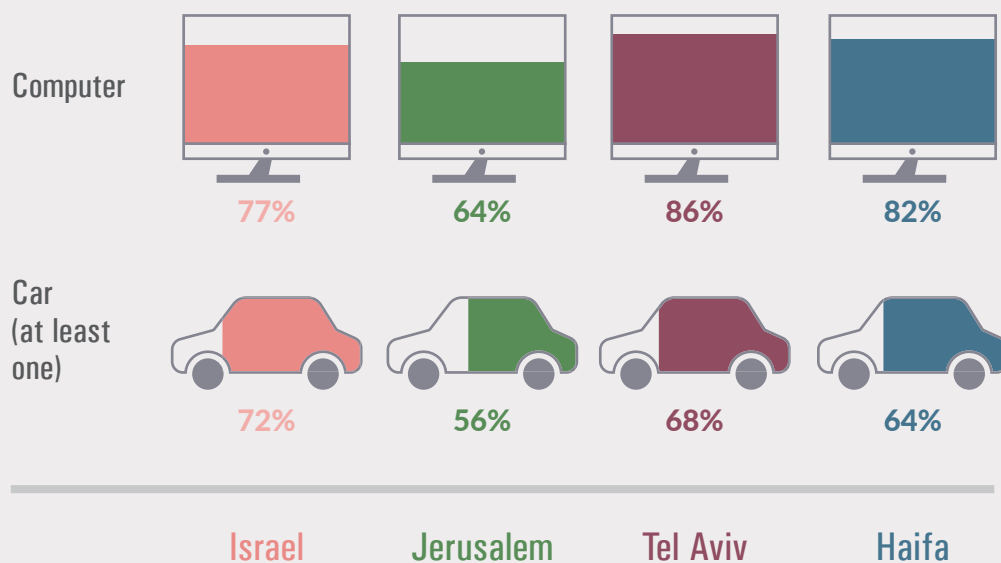

Computer and Car Ownership among Households in Israel, Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, and Haifa, 2018

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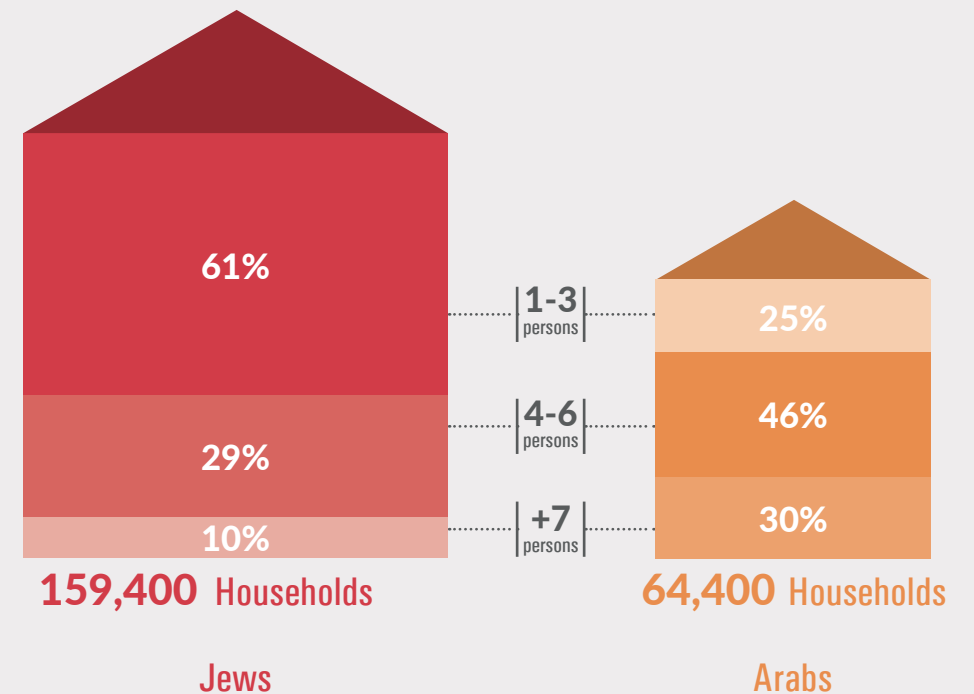
Household Size in Jerusalem by Population Group, 2018

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Average household size

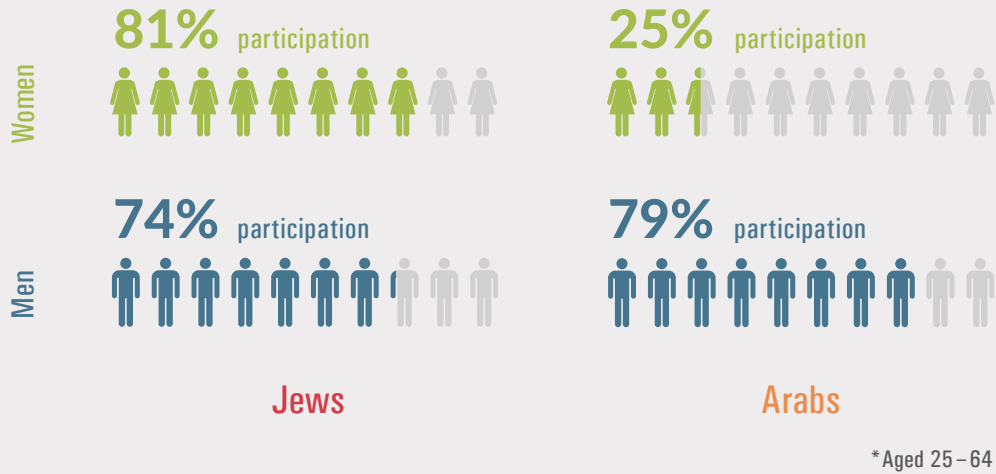


Households, by number of persons in household



Participation Rate in the Labor Force* in Jerusalem, by Population Group and Gender, 2018

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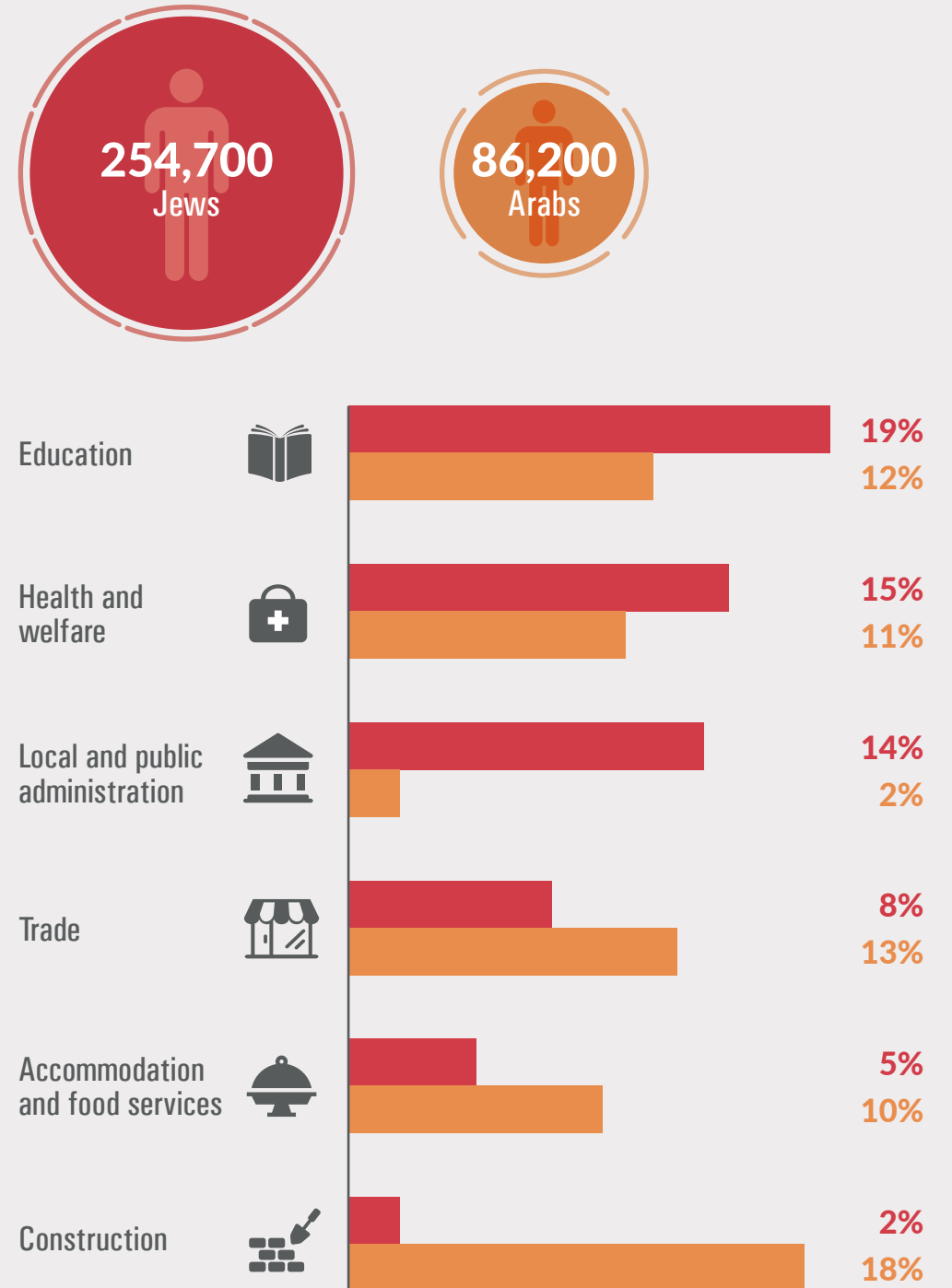
Average Monthly Wage in Israel, Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, and Haifa, by Gender, 2017

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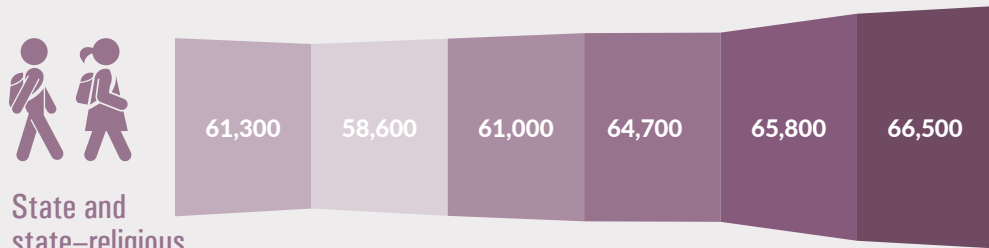
Employed Persons Working in Jerusalem, by Population Group and Selected Economic Sector, 2018

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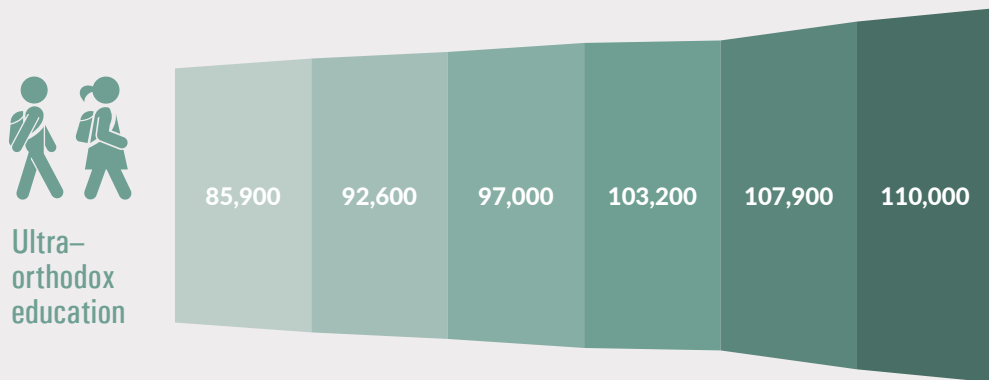


Students in the Education System in Jerusalem, by Sector

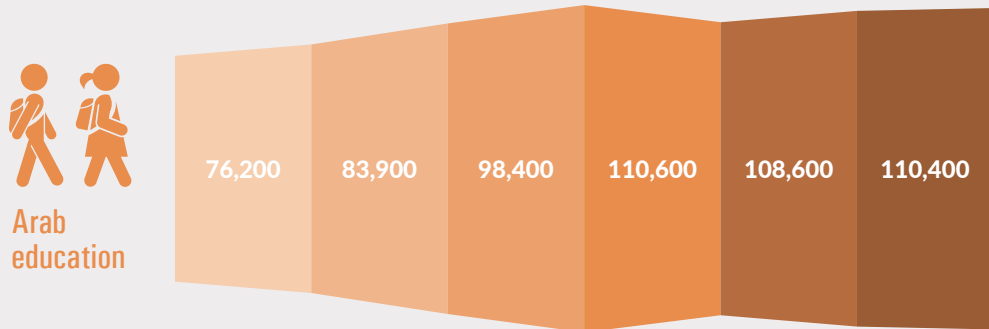
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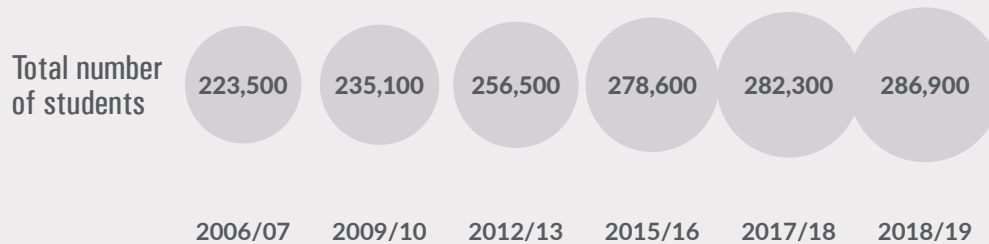
State and state-religious education

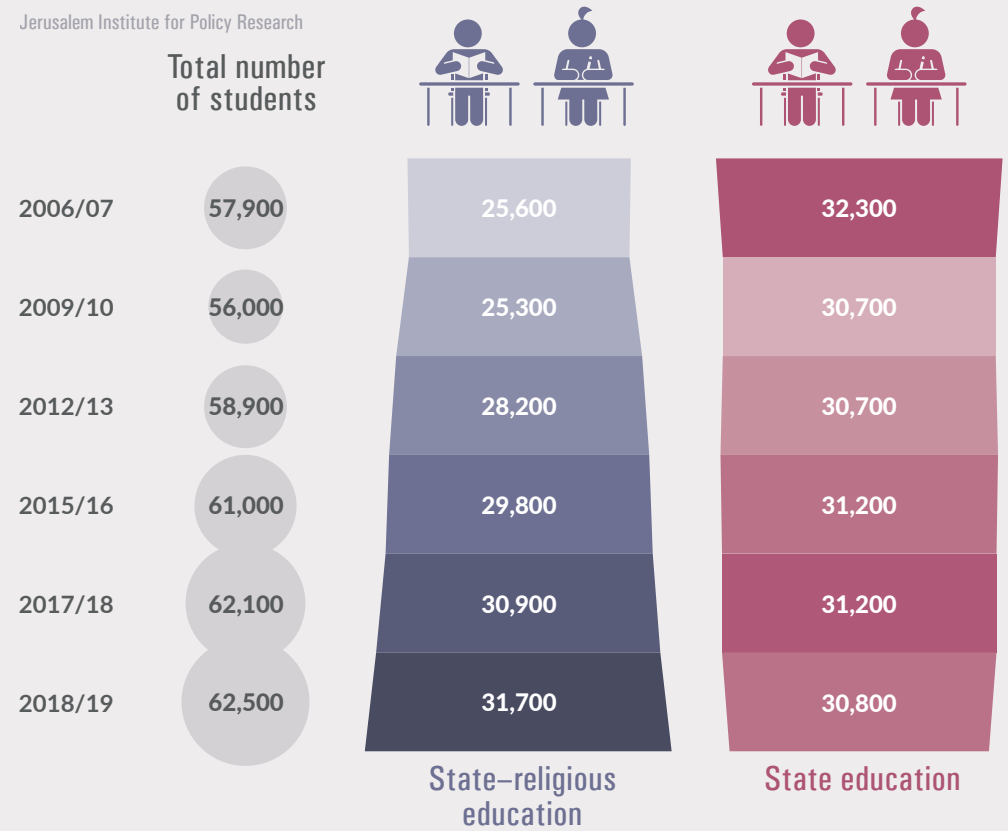


Arab education



Students* in State and State-Religious Education in Jerusalem

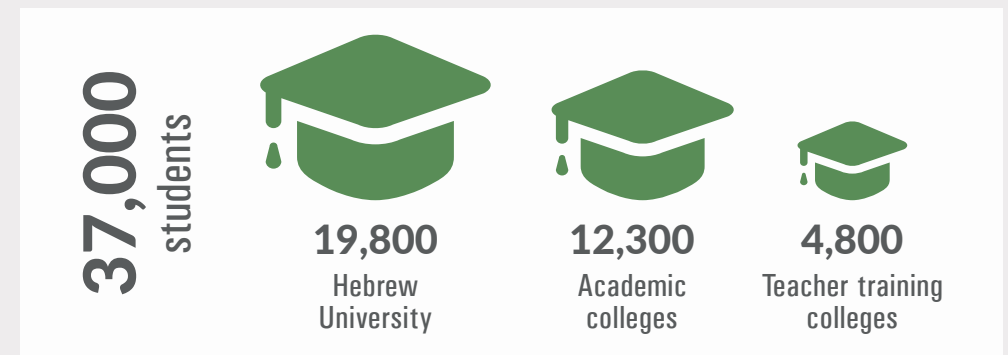

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Apartment Prices* in Israel, Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, and Haifa, 2013, 2019

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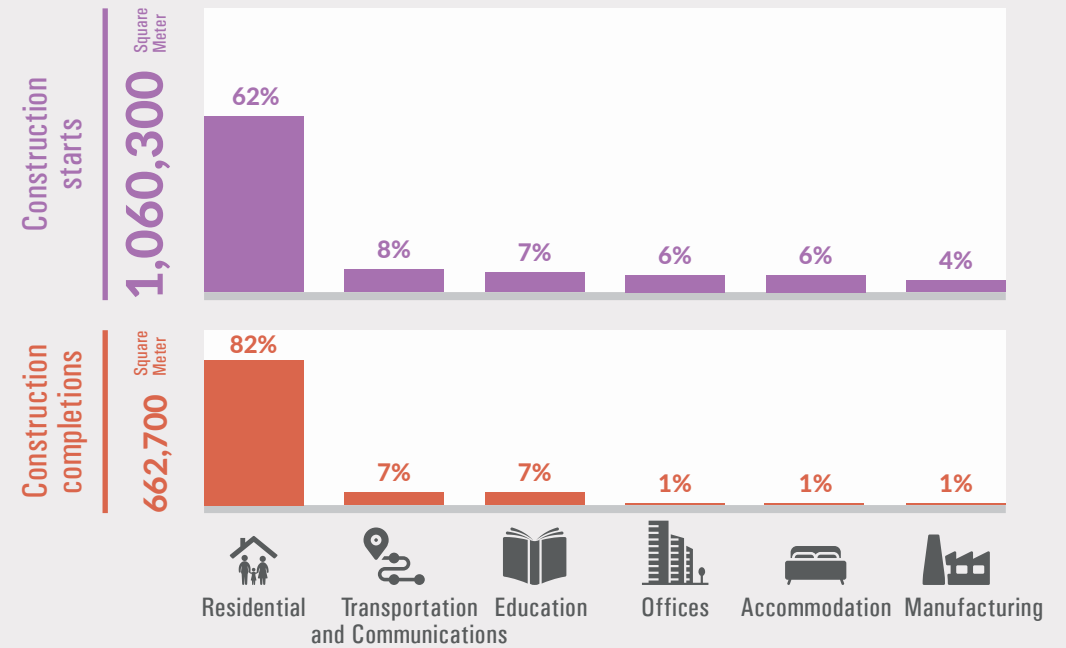

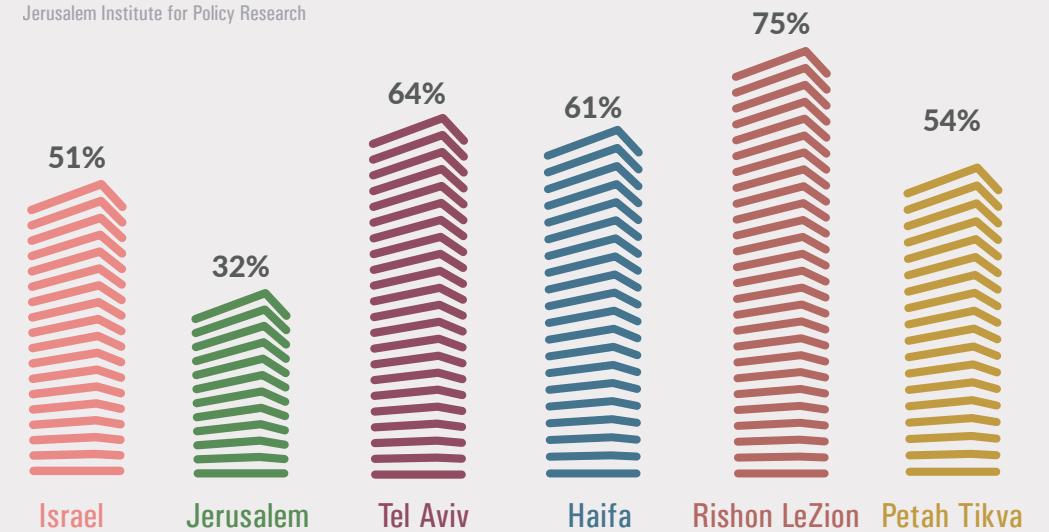
Construction Starts and Completions in Jerusalem, by Main Purpose, 2019

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Construction Starts of Apartments in Tall Buildings,* 2017-2019

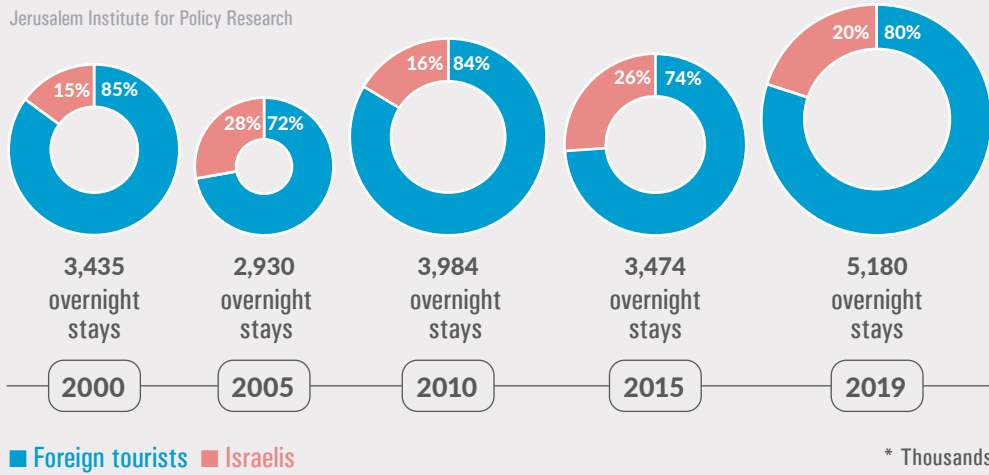
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* Apartments that were built in buildings with 8 or more floors as a percentage of all apartments whose building began in 2017-2019.

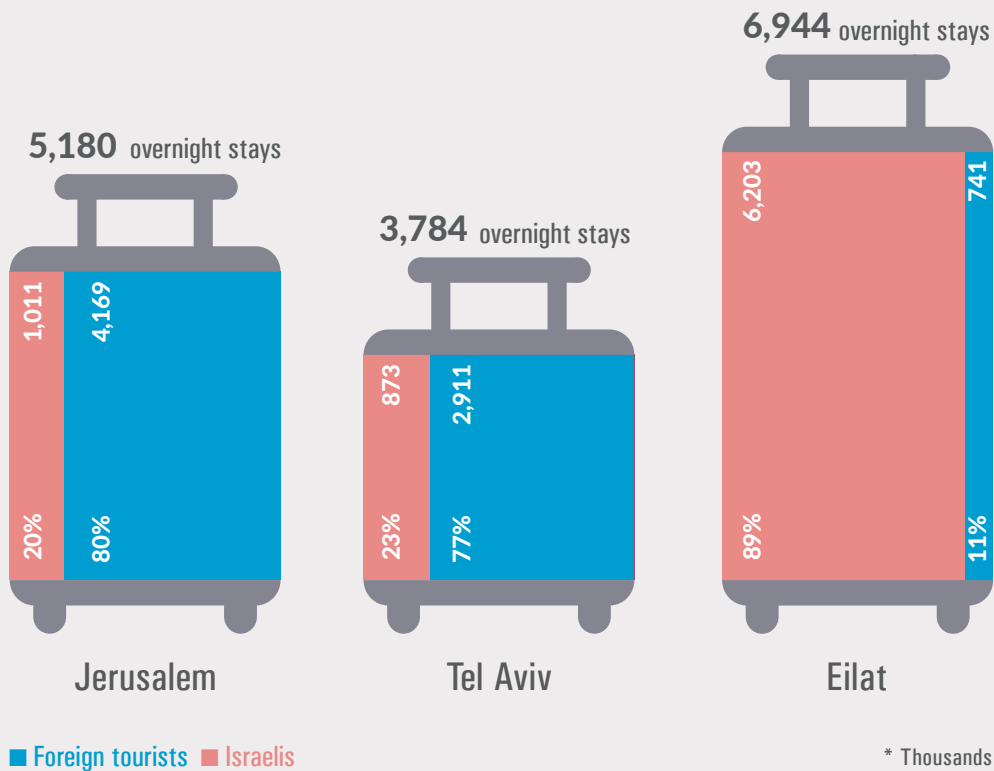
Overnight Stays of Foreign Tourists and Israelis* in Hotels in Jerusalem, 2000 – 2019

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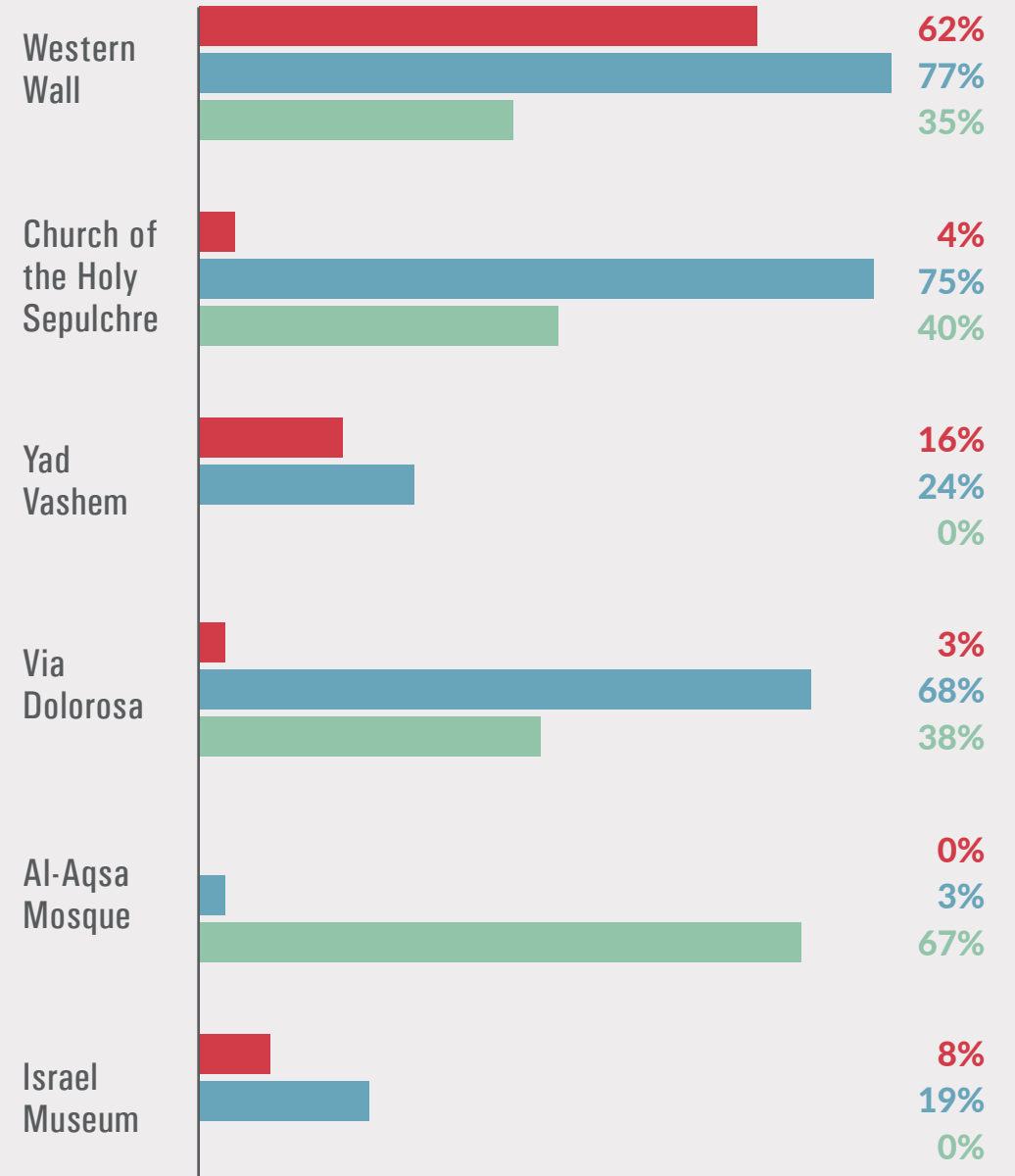
Overnight Stays of Foreign Tourists and Israelis* in Hotels in Jerusalem, Tel Aviv, and Eilat, 2019
